

VETERANS DAY

- 1. Veterans Day is not grammatically incorrect, as many people believe. The Department of Veterans Affairs explains that veterans do not own the holiday, which would make it Veteran’s Day, but instead it is a day to honor them.
- 2. Armistice Day was the original name of Veterans Day. It was called this because it represented the first anniversary of a cessation between Germany and the Allied Nations in World War I.
- 3. The armistice began in 1918, in the eleventh month, on the eleventh day, at the eleventh hour. However, it does not signify the actual end of the war. It merely represents the start of the end.
- 4. Originally, Veterans Day was not intended to take place every year. It was not until 1926 that Congress determined it should be a yearly occurrence.
- 5. It was not until 1938 that the day became a holiday recognized nationwide.
- 6. President Dwight D. Eisenhower is responsible for the name change from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. He did this in 1954, reasoning that the day should be about recognizing veterans who served in any war instead of focusing on the end of one war.
- 7. Once word got around that the focus was shifting off of the end of a single war, some individuals advocated for the day to be known as Mayflower Day. This is because on the same day in 1620, the Pilgrims signed the Mayflower Compact.
- 8. The Veterans Day National Committee was created in 1954 to carry out executive plans for the holiday. The group meets three times each year in Washington, D.C. in preparation for the big day.
- 9. Initially, the chair of the committee was the Administrator of Veterans Affairs. In 1989, Veterans Affairs became a department within the Cabinet, which shifted responsibility of the chair to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs.
- 10. Veterans Day was not always celebrated on November 11. Congress put forth the Uniform Holidays Act in 1968, which specified that the holiday would be observed every October on the fourth Monday. This went through in 1971.
- 11. Four years later, President Gerald Ford undid this move by signing a law that returned the holiday back to November 11.
- 12. Now, Veterans Day is always on November 11. However, if that date falls on a weekend, many businesses “observe” the holiday on the closest weekday — either Friday or Monday — allowing employees the day off of work that they are entitled to.
- 13. Schools may or may not close for Veterans Day. The decision is left to local school boards and officials of private schools.
- 14. A known symbol of Memorial Day is the poppy, but most American Legion Auxiliary groups also make poppies out of red crepe paper by hand in honor of Veterans Day.
- 15. Veterans Day and Memorial Day are distinctly different. Memorial Day is celebrated in honor of soldiers who died “in the line of duty”. Veterans Day honors all soldiers who have served, including those who have passed and those who currently serve.
- 16. Honored veterans do not only encompass the soldiers who went to war. Veterans Day also recognizes those who served their country during peacetime.
- 17. Duties of soldiers during peacetime, or those that simply do not see the war, fulfill other important roles. They may bring relief to areas hit by natural disasters, guard U.S. embassies or provide medical assistance to underserved communities.
- 18. Veterans Day differs from Armed Forces Day as well, since Armed Forces Day is mainly in celebration of the troops who are currently serving their country. This day is recognized every May, on the third Saturday
- 19. More than 400,000 veterans and veterans’ families are buried in the Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. The cemetery spans 624 acres.
- 20. At 11:00 in the morning on Veterans Day each year, the same time that the World War I armistice was originally signed, an observance is held at Arlington National Cemetery. Guards remember the “Unknown Soldier” by laying a wreath on his tomb, followed by a parade of colors conducted by veterans organization.
- 21. However, the oldest and biggest Veterans Day parade began in 1919 and is held along Fifth Avenue in New York City.

Steven was born in Oshkosh, WI, on October 25th, 1954. Steven has a sister, JoAnn.

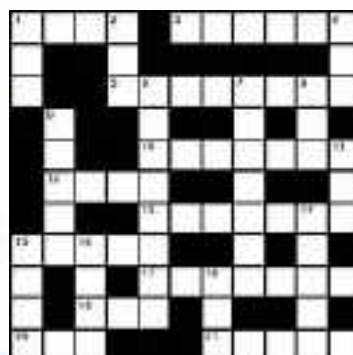
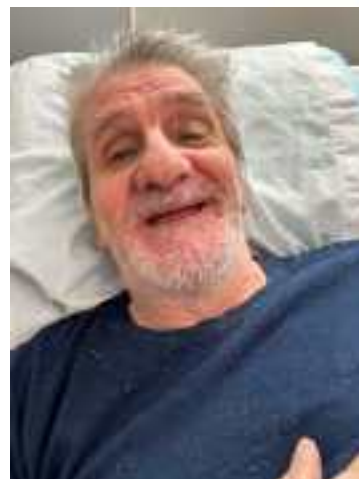

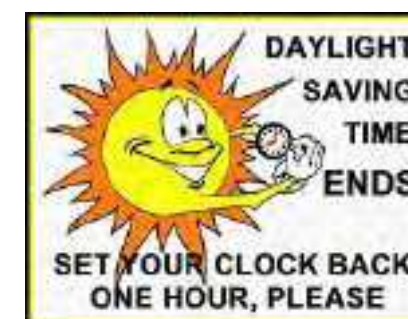

We are having a Fall/Christmas Craft Bazaar on November 21st from

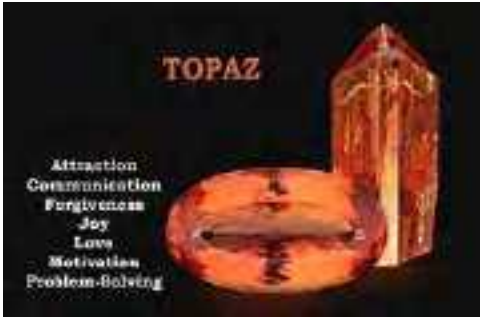

FUN THANKSGIVING FACTS

1. The First Thanksgiving
- The Mayflower pilgrims founded the Plymouth colony in Massachusetts and had a three-day meal with the Wampanoag tribe in 1621.
2. U.S. Towns Named Turkey
- There are four, and they are in Texas, Arizona, Louisiana and North Carolina.
3. Estimated Number of Turkeys Prepared
- Each year, it is estimated that 46 million turkeys are prepared to provide the traditional feast.
4. Football Teams
- The Dallas Cowboys and the Detroit Lions have played the most games on Thanksgiving Day. The Lions have played almost every Thanksgiving since 1934, and the Cowboys since 1966.
5. October 3, 1863
- On this day, Abraham Lincoln declared Thanksgiving a national holiday.
6. Turkey Calories
- Each year, Americans collectively consume three billion calories from turkey alone. Imagine how high that number would be if every other dish were included!
7. 3,150-4,500 Calories Consumed
- You read that right. That is the average number of calories each person consumes on this holiday!
8. 9 Hours and 27 minutes
- This is the amount of time it takes for an average male to burn 4,500 calories. That second slice of pie is definitely worth it, though!
9. Turkeys Sent to the White House
- The National Thanksgiving Turkey Presentation is a ceremony wherein the president is presented with a live turkey each year.
10. 1989
- This is the first year a president (George H.W. Bush) officially pardoned a turkey.
11. The Oldest Thanksgiving Day Parade
- While the Macy’s parade is surely the most popular these days, the oldest is a department store parade in Philadelphia from 1920. The Philadelphia Gimbel Brothers Department Store put on a parade, including only 50 people and 15 cars. It ended with Santa on his sleigh to mark the coming Christmas season.
12. The First Feast
- While turkey is the front runner of Thanksgiving dishes today, the dinner guests at the first Thanksgiving dined on more local foods, including deer. Turkey was likely served, but it was not the main dish
13. Thomas Jefferson
- Before Lincoln officially declared Thanksgiving a national holiday, the president had to declare the holiday each year. Thomas Jefferson, however, refused to do so. He felt that the included prayer of the holiday violated the separation of church and state.
14. Religious Holiday
- The first recorded religious celebration of Thanksgiving took place two years after the first feast in 1621 and marked the end of a two-month drought.
15. Average Guests
- The average number of guests surrounding a modern Thanksgiving dinner table is 9–11.
16. A Toast to Thanks
- The most popular drinks to toast with on Thanksgiving are wine, beer and whiskey (in order of popularity).
- 17.The First Macy’s Thanksgiving Day Parade
- Balloons are of extreme importance in the Macy’s Parade these days. However, the first Macy’s Thanksgiving Day Parade did not feature balloons at all! Instead, animals from the Central Park Zoo were included in the procession.
18. Frozen TV Dinners
- This convenient form of dinner was brought about by a mistake. A Swanson employee accidentally ordered 260 tons of turkey for Thanksgiving in 1953. As a result, the solution to the problem was to sell all of that turkey as frozen dinners!
19. Thanksgiving Preparations
- A whopping 47 percent of Thanksgiving hosts will take time off work in order to properly prep the feast.
20. Preparation Time
- The average amount of time it takes for a host to prepare that feast is 9.6 hours!
21. Thanksgiving Travel
- Approximately 31 percent of Americans travel on Thanksgiving Day, and 47 percent of those travelers drive.
- 22.First Turkey Trot
- The first turkey trot hosted only six participants. Taking place in 1896, the race was five miles long and was held in Buffalo, NY



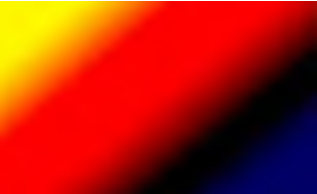

- 1. Veterans Day is not grammatically incorrect, as many people believe. The Department of Veterans Affairs explains that veterans do not own the holiday, which would make it Veteran’s Day, but instead it is a day to honor them.
- 2. Armistice Day was the original name of Veterans Day. It was called this because it represented the first anniversary of a cessation between Germany and the Allied Nations in World War I.
- 3. The armistice began in 1918, in the eleventh month, on the eleventh day, at the eleventh hour. However, it does not signify the actual end of the war. It merely represents the start of the end.
- 4. Originally, Veterans Day was not intended to take place every year. It was not until 1926 that Congress determined it should be a yearly occurrence.
- 5. It was not until 1938 that the day became a holiday recognized nationwide.
- 6. President Dwight D. Eisenhower is responsible for the name change from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. He did this in 1954, reasoning that the day should be about recognizing veterans who served in any war instead of focusing on the end of one war.
- 7. Once word got around that the focus was shifting off of the end of a single war, some individuals advocated for the day to be known as Mayflower Day. This is because on the same day in 1620, the Pilgrims signed the Mayflower Compact.
- 8. The Veterans Day National Committee was created in 1954 to carry out executive plans for the holiday. The group meets three times each year in Washington, D.C. in preparation for the big day.
- 9. Initially, the chair of the committee was the Administrator of Veterans Affairs. In 1989, Veterans Affairs became a department within the Cabinet, which shifted responsibility of the chair to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs.
- 10. Veterans Day was not always celebrated on November 11. Congress put forth the Uniform Holidays Act in 1968, which specified that the holiday would be observed every October on the fourth Monday. This went through in 1971.
- 11. Four years later, President Gerald Ford undid this move by signing a law that returned the holiday back to November 11.
- 12. Now, Veterans Day is always on November 11. However, if that date falls on a weekend, many businesses “observe” the holiday on the closest weekday — either Friday or Monday — allowing employees the day off of work that they are entitled to.
- 13. Schools may or may not close for Veterans Day. The decision is left to local school boards and officials of private schools.
- 14. A known symbol of Memorial Day is the poppy, but most American Legion Auxiliary groups also make poppies out of red crepe paper by hand in honor of Veterans Day.
- 15. Veterans Day and Memorial Day are distinctly different. Memorial Day is celebrated in honor of soldiers who died “in the line of duty”. Veterans Day honors all soldiers who have served, including those who have passed and those who currently serve.
- 16. Honored veterans do not only encompass the soldiers who went to war. Veterans Day also recognizes those who served their country during peacetime.
- 17. Duties of soldiers during peacetime, or those that simply do not see the war, fulfill other important roles. They may bring relief to areas hit by natural disasters, guard U.S. embassies or provide medical assistance to underserved communities.
- 18. Veterans Day differs from Armed Forces Day as well, since Armed Forces Day is mainly in celebration of the troops who are currently serving their country. This day is recognized every May, on the third Saturday
- 19. More than 400,000 veterans and veterans’ families are buried in the Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia. The cemetery spans 624 acres.
- 20. At 11:00 in the morning on Veterans Day each year, the same time that the World War I armistice was originally signed, an observance is held at Arlington National Cemetery. Guards remember the “Unknown Soldier” by laying a wreath on his tomb, followed by a parade of colors conducted by veterans organization.
- 21. However, the oldest and biggest Veterans Day parade began in 1919 and is held along Fifth Avenue in New York City.

FUN THANKSGIVING FACTS

1. The First Thanksgiving
- The Mayflower pilgrims founded the Plymouth colony in Massachusetts and had a three-day meal with the Wampanoag tribe in 1621.
2. U.S. Towns Named Turkey
- There are four, and they are in Texas, Arizona, Louisiana and North Carolina.
3. Estimated Number of Turkeys Prepared
- Each year, it is estimated that 46 million turkeys are prepared to provide the traditional feast.
4. Football Teams
- The Dallas Cowboys and the Detroit Lions have played the most games on Thanksgiving Day. The Lions have played almost every Thanksgiving since 1934, and the Cowboys since 1966.
5. October 3, 1863
- On this day, Abraham Lincoln declared Thanksgiving a national holiday.
6. Turkey Calories
- Each year, Americans collectively consume three billion calories from turkey alone. Imagine how high that number would be if every other dish were included!
7. 3,150-4,500 Calories Consumed
- You read that right. That is the average number of calories each person consumes on this holiday!
8. 9 Hours and 27 minutes
- This is the amount of time it takes for an average male to burn 4,500 calories. That second slice of pie is definitely worth it, though!
9. Turkeys Sent to the White House
- The National Thanksgiving Turkey Presentation is a ceremony wherein the president is presented with a live turkey each year.
10. 1989

13. Thomas Jefferson
- Before Lincoln officially declared Thanksgiving a national holiday, the president had to declare the holiday each year. Thomas Jefferson, however, refused to do so. He felt that the included prayer of the holiday violated the separation of church and state.
14. Religious Holiday
- The first recorded religious celebration of Thanksgiving took place two years after the first feast in 1621 and marked the end of a two-month drought.
15. Average Guests
- The average number of guests surrounding a modern Thanksgiving dinner table is 9–11.
16. A Toast to Thanks
- The most popular drinks to toast with on Thanksgiving are wine, beer and whiskey (in order of popularity).
- 17.The First Macy’s Thanksgiving Day Parade
- Balloons are of extreme importance in the Macy’s Parade these days. However, the first Macy’s Thanksgiving Day Parade did not feature balloons at all! Instead, animals from the Central Park Zoo were included in the procession.
18. Frozen TV Dinners
- This convenient form of dinner was brought about by a mistake. A Swanson employee accidentally ordered 260 tons of turkey for Thanksgiving in 1953. As a result, the solution to the problem was to sell all of that turkey as frozen dinners!
19. Thanksgiving Preparations
- A whopping 47 percent of Thanksgiving hosts will take time off work in order to properly prep the feast.
20. Preparation Time
- The average amount of time it takes for a host to prepare that feast is 9.6 hours!
21. Thanksgiving Travel
- Approximately 31 percent of Americans travel on Thanksgiving Day, and 47 percent of those travelers drive.
- 22.First Turkey Trot
- The first turkey trot hosted only six participants. Taking place in 1896, the race was five miles long and was held in Buffalo, NY



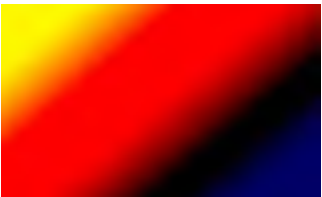
